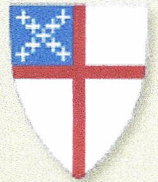

## Rector's Blog

Iona is amazing. It is beautiful here but also in some ways a harsh place. Even on a sunny day there is a constant wind blowing off the sea. Yesterday the temperature was in the mid 50's, but with the wind blowing it felt like the low 40's. Thank God the sun was out. I got here about 9:00 and dropped my stuff at the hotel and set off to explore. I came upon St. Oran's Chapel which is the oldest building on the island dating back to the 12th century. It is a small stone structure in the middle of a cemetery. There was a service going on so I just stood outside. I joined the service at what we would call the Prayers of the People. They invited me to read the psalm which I did. Most of the service was in English with a little Greek thrown in every now and then. It was a beautiful service and I was so glad that I happened by when I did. The Iona Community has residents who live there permanently and guests (about 80 a week stay at the Abby for a week at a time) and then the folks like me who are staying at hotels and inns. I then took a walk around the village and later went on a tour of the Abby. Nothing is left of the monastery that St. Columba established in 563 as the buildings would have primarily been wood and sod, so what is left was built much later. In spite of Viking raids and at least two slaughters of monks during these raids, the island has pretty much had a religious presence since 563. There is a small community of people who live on the island and are not part of the Abby. I think I read that population is around 90. Today is raining and cold. I plan on taking a short walk and then spending the rest of the day reading and keeping warm.

Also there are SHEEP! Lots of sheep and being Spring it is lamb season so lots of lambs! Most of you know, sheep, and in particular, lambs are my most favorite animals in the world. Everywhere you walk you see them in the fields and hear them baaing. Yesterday I watched these little twin lambs running up a hill baaing their little hearts out and then a mother turned and started baaing and running towards them. They met in the middle and the lambs rubbed up against their mom, it was so sweet. There are plain white sheep and black face sheep and yesterday I saw a black lamb in the middle of all the white ones, it was so pretty. My first night I walked into the dining room at the hotel and black face lamb was the special on the menu! I know it is a fact of life, but how could you watch those darling little creatures romping in the fields and then eat one for dinner? Needless to say I had the fish!

Lindisfarne is much different than Iona. It is larger, the village is much bigger, there are more tourists and it has the feel more of a national park than the Holy Island that it is. It is beautiful though with lots of birds of various kinds, seals, both white beachy and rocky shores and a castle. A little history of the island: the island was given to Aidan by the Anglo-Saxon King Oswald in 635 to bring Christianity to the Northumbrians. Aidan had traveled here from Iona where he had been a monk with Columba. It is from here that Christianity spread to the English speaking people of what is now England. The other Saint associated with Lindisfarne is Cuthbert. He was bishop and Abbot here after the Synod of Whitby and died here in 687. He was buried here and 11 years later when his body was exhumed it was found to be uncorrupted, a sign of sanctity. In 793 those nasty Vikings begin their raids until in 875 when the monks, taking Cuthbert's body, abandoned the island.

Here is a prayer of good wishes to you from the Celtic Tradition: I pray for thee a joyous life, Honour, estate and good repute, No sigh from thy breast, No tear from thine eye. No hindrance on thy path, No shadow on thy face, Until thou lie down in that mansion, In the arms of Christ benign.

Not much else to say, except I really feel God's hand in this whole experience. It is just amazing how things have continued to fall into place and gone so perfectly, like the weather.

### **St James' Memorial Walkway Fundraiser**

We sold 88 bricks for our Memorial Walkway. All completed order forms were sent to the engraver on May 22, 2012. We expect to receive a proof of each brick by the first of June. Each person who purchased a brick will be asked to review the proof of his/her brick(s) and approve the wording/spelling prior to engraving. Once all the proofs have been approved, they will be returned to the engraver and we should receive engraved bricks within 4-6 weeks. Denison Landscaping will then install the walkway.

The walkway will consist of the original 88 engraved bricks as well as plain bricks. Plain bricks can be replaced with engraved bricks as additional memorial bricks are purchased. Thus the memorial will continue to grow.

To each of you, who purchased a brick, thank you for making this walkway possible. We hope that the walkway will be a source of comfort, peace, and beauty honoring you and your loved ones.

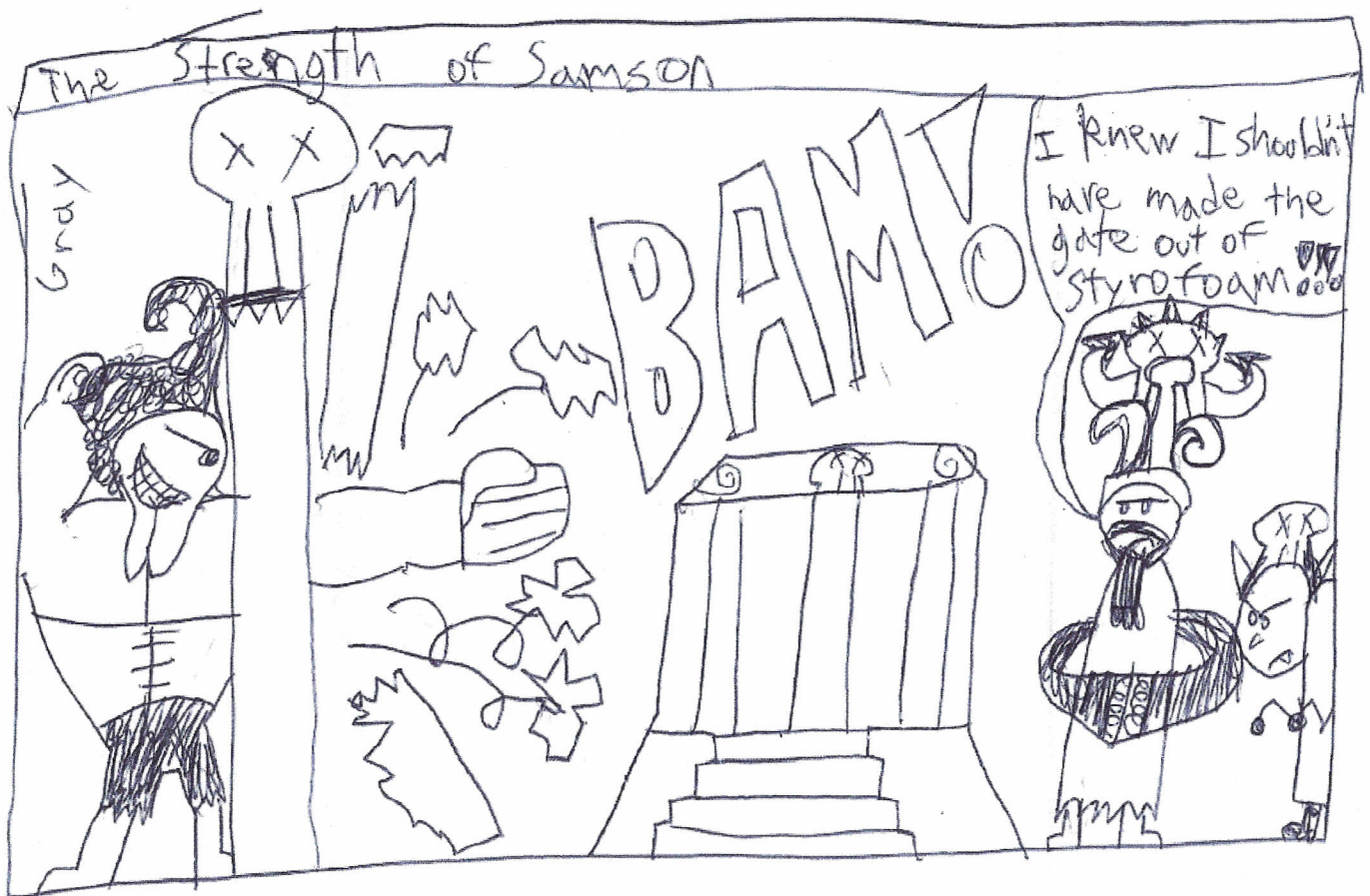
