



Where Did You Go?

The summer of 1957 seems like such a long time ago. Could it really be almost 50 years? I turned 8 that summer and oh what a summer it was. I got to spend time with my Grandmother and Grandfather on the farm! I don't remember the weather; do kids remember weather? I just remember the farm and the work and dinner time. My Grandfater, Pop Pop, gave me my first job that summer. My responsibility was to make sure that all the men had sticks handy on which to spear the tobacco plants they were chopping. So I would run over to the trailer, grab an armload of sticks, and then drop them near the men as they moved down the rows; chopping, spearing, chopping, spearing, and sweating. Oh my gosh, I remember the sweat, not the heat, just the sweat. And sticky too, boy was it sticky moving around all those tobacco plants. Pop Pop paid me a penny for each stick I delivered and boy did I feel important. I had a job!

We all came in out of the fields around noon for dinner. Dinner was the big meal of the day on the farm. I don't really remember much on the table that wasn't grown or raised on the farm. My favorite was the strawberries and cream we often had. We always ate down in the basement where it was cool and dark. I don't remember Pop Pop ever saying much. Years later I was told by a family friend that they never once heard him say anything. Imagine that!

What he did do though was teach me a lot. Neat stuff, like how to drive a tractor. He'd get me up there on his lap and boy was I king of the world! I felt so big on that tractor with the breeze in my face and tobacco plants rushing by. The real skill came in backing up the trailer. Anybody can go forward! He taught me the importance of teamwork. In the field we were all equal, there was no prejudice, we all had a job to do and together we got it done. We weren't trying to score any points. We just all moved in a synchronous dance of harvesting tobacco and hanging it in the barn. He taught me about waste. There's no waste on the farm, everything has a use and every action has a purpose. Table scraps? Hogs got that. Hole in your pants? Sew it up.

Most of all I remember the cycle of life and what he showed me about it. He didn't have to say anything about it - to do so would have been silly. Just look around and take notice. Where did that cow come from and how come there's milk to be had? I saw the reasons and I knew. I knew where the fried chicken came from and I knew where the pork chops came from. There was an unspoken reverence surrounding the cycle of life on the farm. And I have never forgotten those early lessons.

Such a long time ago and yet so near, so dear. It was late August and Pop Pop moved on.

"One day beside his body I was kneeling, In a field not far away, Where angel wings were stirring. He heard the call for supper time in heaven, And I know he's waiting for me there."
